1247	Odo Burnard acquires 40 acres of land in Everton from Michael Burdet, but it is unclear if this relates to the Manor of Everton.		
1263	Nicholas and Felicia Burnard alienates (conveys) a messuage (dwelling) and a carucates (60-160 acres) of land with appurtenances (rights) to Thomas D'Espaigne.

Date	History of Lordship	Monarchs
Before 1307	Everton passes to Walter Langton, Bishop of Coventry and Lichfield. The Bishop obtains a grant to hold a market and fair in Everton.	Edward I 1272-1307
1332	The Bishop dies leaving Everton to his nephew, Edmund, son of Robert Peverel.	Edward II 1307-27 Edward III 1327-77
Unknown	On Edmund's death Everton passes to his son and heir, John.	
Unknown	John dies and Everton passes to his sister Margaret, wife of William de la Pole.	
1354	William de la Pole is recorded as being Lord of the Manor.	
1359	William's son John de la Pole succeeds his father and marries Joan, daughter of John de Cobham.	
1403	William and Joan's daughter are holding Everton with her second husband, Sir Reginald Braybrooke. She is Baroness Cobham in her own right (suo jure).	Richard II 1377-1399 Henry IV 1399-1413
1433	Joan dies leaving a daughter Joan, who marries Sir Thomas Brooke.	Henry V 1413-22 Henry VI 1422-61 1470-71
1442	Joan dies leaving Everton to her granddaughter, Elizabeth Brooke, who is married to Robert Tanfield.	
1455-1487	<b>War of the Roses</b>	Edward IV 1461-70 1471-83 Edward V 1483 Richard III 1483-5 Henry VII 1485-1509
1503	Elizabeth holds Everton until her death when her grandson William (aged fifteen) inherits.	Henry VIII 1485-1509
1530	William dies and is succeeded by his son Francis.	Henry VIII 1509-47
1534	<b>The Act of Supremacy – Church of England</b>	
Unknown	Francis dies leaving Everton to his son Clement.	Edward VI 1547-53 Mary I 1553-58 Elizabeth I 1558-1603
1587	Clement dies and Everton is inherited by his son William Tanfield.	
1615	William conveys Everton to pay a fine to Sir Humphrey Winch, one of the Justices of the King's Bench.	James I 1603-25

1624	Sir Humphrey dies leaving Everton to his son Onslow.	Charles I 1625-49
1626	The Pembrokes and then the Norfolks have been Overlords for nearly 500 years holding Everton with the Manor of Weston. This is the last mention of the Overlordship where Everton is being held of Sir Thomas Puckeringe of the Manor of Weston.	
1642-1651	<b>English Civil War</b>	
1652	Onslow dies leaving Everton to Sir Humphrey's grandson, Humphrey.	
1659	Humphrey alienates (conveys) Everton to Philip Story.	Charles II 1660-85
1693	Philip Story is confirmed as being Lord of the Manor of Everton. This is the last record of the lordship.	James II 1685-88 William III 1688-1702
