1390	Hugh of Greenford transfers his Greenford lands (it is assumed that this would have included the manor and lordship) to John Broke of Chesham (Bucks.) in trust for his daughter who has married William Broke.	Richard II 1377-1399

1531	Joan Fyllyns (or Reynolds), daughter of William Broke of Chesham sells Greenford including 190 acres of land to Henry Bradshaw. Henry almost immediately sells Greenford to Robert Cheeseman of Southall.	
<b>1534</b>	<b>The Act of Supremacy – Church of England</b>	
1534	Robert sells Greenford (it is assumed both the manor and lordship) to John Smith, a successful baker of London.	Edward VI 1547-53 Mary I 1553-58 Elizabeth I 1558-1603
1601	The Smith family pass Greenford to George, a cousin of John Smith.	
1610	Greenford is in the hands of John Coston of London, but it is unknown how this has come about. Nothing further is recorded about this particular manor and lordship of Greenford.	James I 1603-25
