1086	Stockland is given to William de Mohun a follower of William the Conqueror who by Domesday has been appointed Sheriff of Somerset and held Dunster Castle.

Unknown	Azilia has outlived her husband and son, Roger de Newburgh as she leaves Shurton to her grandson Robert de Newburgh. The inheritance is not without issue as there is a prolonged dispute over who had right to the lordship.		
1247	Robert dies leaving a son and heir Henry who subenfeuds the Lordship to create a Mesne (middle) Lordship.		Edward VI 1547-53

1264-1267	Second Barons War	
1271	Henry surrenders the Mesne Lordship in Shurton. Shurton is held by Agnes Bausan, widow of Sir Stephen Bausan and now wife of Sir Anketil de Martival.	
Unknown	Agnes probably has a life interest as Shurton passes to Joan Bausan, the daughter of Sir Stephen Bausan's brother, Richard.	Edward I 1272-1307
1279	Joan and her son, Richard Huish, are jointly holding Shurton.	
1283	Joan sub-enfoes half of the Lordship to Hawise Raleigh.	
1285	Joan dies and Richard is confirmed as being half Mesne Lord and holding half the Lordship in demesne.	
1297	Richard dies leaving a son and heir of the same name.	
1331	Richard dies leaving another son and heir called Richard.	Edward II 1307-27 Edward III 1327-77
1361	Richard dies leaving a son William, who is still a minor at his father's death.	
1379	William dies without issue and the Lordship is granted to his widow Ricarda and her second husband Sir Thomas Fichet.	Richard II 1377-1399
1386	Sir Thomas dies.	
1390	Ricarda dies leaving an infant son, Thomas.	
1395	Thomas dies and the half of the Shurton Lordship held in demesne passes to Sir Thomas and Ricarda's daughter, Isabel, wife of Robert Hill.	
Unknown	On Isabel's death the Lordship is inherited by her son, John.	Henry IV 1399-1413 Henry V 1413-22
1434	John dies leaving a son and heir of the same name.	Henry VI 1422-61 1470-71
1455	John dies and the Lordship and Manor are split again with John's daughter, Genevieve (wife of Sir William Say) inheriting one third with John's widow, Margaret, inheriting two thirds. Genevieve's third not being referred to again.

1497	On Margaret's death the two thirds are split again between John's two nieces, Joan (wife of Sir Richard Pudsey) and Isabel (wife of Edward Waldegrave).	Henry VII 1485-1509 Henry VIII 1509-47
1534	The Act of Supremacy – Church of England	
1543	Isabel and Edward leave a son John Waldegrave who has acquired a third of his Aunt Joan's share. John dies leaving a son, Sir Edward who purchases the rest of Joan's share in Shurton.	
1561	Sir Edward dies leaving his son Charles who is still a minor.	Mary I 1553-58 Elizabeth I 1558-1603
1632	Charles dies leaving a son and heir Sir Edward.	James I 1603-25 Charles I 1625-49
1642-1651	English Civil War	
1647	Sir Edward dies leaving a son and heir Henry.	
1658	Henry dies leaving a son and heir Charles.	
1684	Charles dies leaving a son and heir Henry, who is later to become Baron Waldegrave.	Charles II 1660-85
1689	Baron Waldegrave dies leaving a son and heir James, 2nd Baron Waldegrave.	James II 1685-88 William III 1688-1702
1726	James sells Shurton to Joseph Ruscombe and the estate is broken up, no longer being referred to as a Lordship or Manor.	Anne 1702-14 George I 1714/27
