1219	James Newmarch dies holding the Lordship and Manor of Upton. He leaves two daughters Isabel and Hawise. This Lordship and Manor of Upton Moels is the moiety left to Hawise. She is first married to John Botreaux, secondly to Nicholas de Moels.		
1264	Nicolas dies having outlived his wife, Hawise. They leave a son and heir, Roger de Moels who owns half of the Barony of North Cadbury. Roger takes part in many Welsh campaigns, one as Marshal.		
1264-1267	Second Barons War		
1295	Roger dies leaving a son and heir John de Moels, Lord Moels who becomes Lord of Upton Moels.		Edward I 1272-1307

Date	History of Lordship	Monarchs
1310	John de Moels dies leaving his son and heir Nicholas, Lord Moels.	Edward II 1307-27
1316	Nicholas dies in the early part of the year to be succeeded by his brother Roger. Roger dies 6 months later and the family titles and estates including Upton Moels pass to his younger brother Sir John.	
1337	Sir John dies leaving two daughters. Isabel, the younger daughter with her husband William Botreaux inherit Upton Moels.	Edward III 1327-77
1349	William and Isabel die within a few days of each other and leave a son and heir, another William.	
Unknown	William fights in both Saxony and Portugal and receives a Peerage, Lord Botreaux.	
Unknown	Lord Botreaux grants Upton Moels to John Hone for his life.	
1391	Lord Botreaux dies leaving a son and heir of the same name.	Richard II 1377-1399
1395	This Lord Botreaux, also William dies leaving another William as Lord Botreaux.	
1407/8	John Hone dies and Upton Moels reverts to Lord Botreaux.	Henry IV 1399-1413
Unknown	Lord Botreaux accompanies King Henry V on his expedition to France.	Henry V 1413-22
1455-1487	War of the Roses	Henry VI 1422-61 1470-71
1462	Lord Botreaux dies leaving a daughter, Margaret (widow of Robert second Lord Hungerford) who becomes Baroness Botreaux.	Edward IV 1461-70 1471-83
1466	Baroness Botreaux together with her grandson Thomas Hungerford and his wife sell Upton Moels to William Kerver, John Ashe and others to be held by Ashe and his heirs.	Edward V 1483
Prior to 1484	William and John grant Upton Moels to Anne, the wife of Geoffrey Kidwelly. Anne owns the Nottingham Fee in the parish and the land is merged and the lordship of Upton Moels is lost.	Richard III 1483-5
