Before 1257	The land which creates Stickleton Manor is given to Ankerwyke Priory in Buckinghamshire. It is donated by Nicholas de Farnham and Walter the Franklin and consists of a house, 186 ½ acres, 22s 9d in rents and is assessed as 1/6 knight's fee.

Late 14 th to Early 15 th century	The priory's holding in Stickleton increases significantly to 2 knight's fees with further gifts from Humphrey de Bohun, Earl of Hereford and Essex. The ownership has also become shared with John de Bealmont.		

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Mid 15 th century	The Priory's holding has reduced to 1 knight's fee with much of the later gift passing by marriage to Thomas, Duke of Gloucester. The lordship is part of the honour of Mandeville.	Henry VI 1422-61 1470-71

1534	The Act of Supremacy – Church of England	
1537	Henry VIII dissolves the Priory and transfers all of its property to the newly founded Abbey of Bisham in Berkshire. The tenant farmer, James Cole, remains on the farm.	
1539	The Abbey of Bisham does not last long and is dissolved by the Crown. Its property is granted to Andrew, Lord Windsor by Henry VIII. No doubt for his services as "Keeper of the Wardrobe" which he has undertaken since 1506.	
1543	Andrew dies aged 76, leaving a son and heir, William Windsor who becomes 2 nd Baron of Windsor. William has previously been the MP for Chipping Wycombe and also Sheriff of Buckinghamshire and Bedfordshire.	
1558	William dies aged 60 and names his son Edward as his heir, although he is only 14 at this time.	Edward VI 1547-53 Mary I 1553-58
1574	Edward dies aged 30 but has some success in his lifetime. He was appointed Knight of the Carpet by Queen Mary the day after her coronation. He also fought at the Battle of St Quentin and the Italian War of 1551 to 1559. He was also the hereditary warden of Windsor Castle...Edward is succeeded by his son Frederick who is only fifteen.	Elizabeth I 1558-1603
1585	Frederick dies aged 27 with no children and leaves his assets including Stickleton and the Barony to his brother Henry Windsor, 4 th Baron of Windsor.	
1587	Henry sells Stickleton to Jerome Beale.	
1633	Henry Beale, now Lord of Stickleton and Greenford, sells the it to William Penifather.	James I 1603-25 Charles I 1625-49

1715	Edward Bennett and his son convey Stickleton to the trustees for Frances Arundell (widow) whose daughter, Frances, marries James Rogers..
