1254	Parnel (wife of John de Caldecote) gives up her claim in dower in Kinsham and another Manor, Caldecote, in exchange for an annuity of 10s.		
Unknown	Kinsham passes to Nicholas de Mitton.		
Unknown	Nicholas de Mitton gives Kinsham with the Manor of Mitton to John de Thorndon.		
1296/7	John passes Kinsham with Mitton to Nicholas le Chamberlain. From it John is to be paid half the rent which Nicholas agrees to pay to John in exchange for the two Manors.

1299	Nicholas sells Kinsham to Peter Crok.	Edward I 1272-1307
1264-1267	Second Barons War	
1301/2	John de Thorndon gives a rent of £10, half of which derives from Kinsham, to Guy de Beauchamp, Earl of Warwick.	
Unknown	Peter Crok sells his interest in Kinsham to Walter de Beauchamp or his wife Alice.	
1304/5	Guy, Earl of Warwick is receiving rent from Alice de Beauchamp, however later in this year he gives up all his claim in Kinsham to her.	
1327	Lady Alice de Beauchamp is confirmed as still holding Kinsham.	Edward II 1307-27
Before 1334/5	Kinsham passes to Sir William de Beauchamp.	Edward III 1327-77
1348	Sir William settles Kinsham on himself for life with a reversion to Thomas de Bradeston and his heirs.	
1360/1	Sir Thomas dies leaving Kinsham to his grandson and heir Thomas.	
1374/5	Thomas dies with no male heir, so leaves Kinsham to his daughter Elizabeth.	
Before 1396	Elizabeth marries Walter de la Pole.	Richard II 1377-1399 Henry IV 1399-1413 Henry V 1413-22
1423	Elizabeth dies leaving Kinsham to her grandson Edmund Inglethorpe.	Henry VI 1422-61 1470-71
1452	Edmund sells Kinsham to John Beauchamp, Lord Beauchamp of Powick.
