| 1535 | Stavordale Priory is now controlled by Taunton Priory so Barrow Lane is now in their ownership. | |
| 1544 | Barrow Lane passes with Roundhill in Wincanton to William Stourton, 7 th Baron Stourton. William has previously been an MP but found the role too taxing. He is a better military commander playing a key role in the Pilgrimage of Grace (The Yorkshire uprising) and with the outbreak of war with Scotland this year. As to his connection with the monarchy he bore the towel at the christening of Prince Edward (to become Edward VI). | |
| 1546 | William accompanies Earl of Hertford to France where he is appointed Deputy of Newhaven. | |
| 1548 | William is estranged from his wife on his death and leaves her and his two youngest sons nothing. His oldest, Charles, receives very little but his mistress Agnes Rice (grand-daughter of Thomas Howard, 2 nd Duke of Norfolk) receives the bulk of his estate. Later this year the Probate Act overturned his will and his estate was granted to his son, Charles 8 th Baron Stourton. | Edward VI 1547-53 |
| 1553 | Charles is asked by Mary Tudor to help with the succession crisis but hesitated in his support until it was certain she would win the succession. | Mary I 1553-58 |
| 1557 | Charles has a violent temper and is involved in many property disputes. He is tried for murder, with four of his servants, for killing William and his son John Hartgill (two of his neighbours) by cutting their throats. Charles initially did not plea but was reminded that if he did not he would be tortured by having heavy stones placed on his body until he did. Charles is found guilty and executed. John Dyer, probably a tenant of Baron Stourton, acquires Barrow Lane. | |
| Unknown | John dies and Barrow Lane passes to his eldest son and heir Lawrence. | Elizabeth I 1558-1603 |
| 1578 | Lawrence dies and Barrow Lane is inherited by his brother John. | |
| 1597 | John dies and his son Francis inherits Barrow Lane. | |

| 1615 | Francis dies childless and Barrow Lane is inherited by his brother-in-law Henry married to his sister Ann. | James I 1603-25 Charles I 1625-49 Charles II 1660-85 |
| Prior to 1637 | Henry dies leaving Barrow Lane to Francis Baynton. | James II 1685-88 |

| 1650 | Barrow Lane, now mortgaged, is conveyed to James and Richard Churchey. | George I 1714/27 George II 1727/60 |
| 1677 | James dies leaving Barrow Lane to the guardians of his son James Laurence Churchey. | |
| 1716 | James Laurence dies with no direct heir so his nephew Nathaniel Webb inherits Barrow Lane. | |
| 1732 | Nathaniel dies and leaves Barrow Lane to his son and heir of the same name. | |
| 1750-1850 | Industrial Revolution | George III 1760-1820 |
| 1782 | Nathaniel dies and is succeeded by his son also called Nathaniel. | |
| 1786 | Barrow Lane is incorporated into the families' principle estate, Roundhill, and is not referred to as a manor or lordship again. | George IV 1820-30 William IV 1830-7 Victoria 1837-1901 Edward VII 1901-10 George V 1910-36 Edward VIII 1936 |
