Unknown	Nigel le Gras grants an estate in Gostrode to Alwin de Gostrode.		
1254/5	Alwin dies leaving Gostrode to his son and heir Edward, is only 10 acres at this time.		
1264-1267	<b>Second Barons War</b>		
Unknown	Edward dies and Gostrode passes to William de Gostrode as a tenant of the parent lordship of Poyle but it has grown to 40 acres of land.		

# Lordship of Gostrode

Date	History of Lordship	Monarchs
1285	Nicholas le Gras, Sheriff of Surrey, is lord of Gostrode.	Edward I 1272-1307
1293	Nicholas dies leaving a son and heir Ralph.	
1302/3	William de Gostrode dies leaving Gostrode to his son and heir Thurstan who pays relief for a messuage (farmhouse) and 52 acres.	
1303	Ralph dies childless and his interest in Gostrode passes to his brother Roger. Roger has Robert de Dol of Loseley as his overlord to do a service of 1/12 of a knight's fee. Roger is murdered in Essex childless and so his brother Nicholas aged 22 inherits Gostrode.	
Unknown	Nicholas dies and Gostrode is inherited by his son, also Nicholas.	Edward II 1307-27
1320	Thurstan's interest in Gostrode passes to John de Gostrode, the Bishop of Salisbury's bailiff in Godalming.	
1325	William Gostrode is pardoned for acquiring 7 shillings of rent in Chiddingfold from John de la Poyle without a licence.	
1328	William dies leaving a son and heir William. Nicholas le Gras is no longer lord over Gostrode as Gostrode is recorded as being held of King Edward III for a service of 6d a year, paid to the sheriff as the overlord John de la Poyle is a minor.	Edward III 1327-77
Approx. 1352	William dies leaving a son and heir Thurstan de Gostrode. Gostrode is held by serjeanty (service) to Henry de la Poyle in Guildford and Stoke. Gostrode consists of a farmhouse, 40 acres of land and 12 acres of wood.
