1066	<b>Norman Conquest- Battle of Hastings</b>		
1086	<b>Domesday</b> Simon, the first known lord of Houghtons, which is part of 1 hide (120 acres) and 1 virgate (30 acres) of land in Great Houghton owing service to Countess Judith as overlord.		
1200	Elias (son of Oger de Lisurs) impleads (sues) William de Houghton (son of Simon and husband of Isabel [daughter of Robert Daubeney]) for ½ virgate (15 acres) of land in Houghton.		William II 1087-1100 Henry I 1100-35 Stephen 1135-54 Henry II 1154-89 Richard I 1189-99 John 1199-1216
1215	<b>Magna Carta</b>		
1215-1217	<b>First Barons War</b>		Henry III 1216-72
1234	William dies leaving a son and heir also William.		
1247	William claims the advowson (the right to appoint the clergy) of the church and 2 carucates (240 acres) of land representing Houghtons Manor.		

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1263	William changes his name to William Daubeney in homage to his mother's family and claims all his mother's lands that are held in chief (held direct of the King).	
1264-1267	<b>Second Barons War</b>	
Unknown	William dies leaving a son and heir Simon who is still a minor.	
1265	Henry de Hastings holds Houghtons as guardian of Simon.	
1272	Simon dies leaving 3 sisters or daughters as his heirs: Isabel (or Elizabeth), Christine and Joan (wife of Hugh de Lacy).	Edward I 1272-1307
Before 1286	Joan marries Roger Dakeney who is created Lord of Houghtons by the right of his wife.	
Unknown	William Parke holds Houghtons in the right of his wife Margaret. His ownership is confirmed by a Crown grant for life.	Edward II 1307-27 Edward III 1327-77 Richard II 1377-1399 Henry IV 1399-1413 Henry V 1413-22 Henry VI 1422-61 1470-71
Prior to 1440	William dies leaving a son and heir John. King Henry makes a grant of Houghtons to confirm John's right.

Unknown	Houghtons passes to John's grandson Lewis.	
1534	<b>The Act of Supremacy – Church of England</b>	
Approx. 1592	Lewis dies leaving a daughter and heir Isabel.	
Unknown	Isabel marries Lewis (son of John Atterbury).	
Unknown	Lewis dies leaving a son and heir also Lewis.	James I 1603-25
1631	Lewis dies leaving a son and heir Stephen.	
1637/8	Stephen sues his stepmother for the manor. It contains the principle farm, a dovecote and 133 acres.	

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1642-1651	<b>English Civil War</b>	Charles I 1625-49
Unknown	Stephen dies leaving a son and heir Francis Atterbury clerk.	
1655	Francis, with his son and heir Lewis makes a settlement of Parkes Manor.	
Prior to 1657	Francis dies leaving his son and heir Lewis (rector of Middleton-Malsor).	
1660	Lewis becomes chaplain to Henry, Duke of Gloucester.	Charles II 1660-85
1693	Lewis drowns leaving a son and heir of the same name. Lewis' (the younger) first career is as a chaplain but he re-trains by obtaining a Bachelor and Doctor of Civil Law.	James II 1685-88 William III 1688-1702
1695	Lewis becomes a preacher at Highgate Chapel. Upon seeing the lack of affordable medical advice, he decides to study medicine.	
1731	Lewis dies aged 76, all four of his children predeceasing him, leaving Houghtons to his granddaughter who only survives a short while. It then passes to his nephew Osborn (son of the Bishop of Rochester).	Anne 1702-14 George I 1714/27 George II 1727/60
1738	Osborn conveys Houghtons to William Lock. This is the last known reference to Houghtons Manor.
