Unknown	Gilbert (son of John Hansard), probably a tenant, pays the monks of Rievaulx 27 pennies for 1½ carucates and 3 pennies for ½ carucate in Ingram which Master Ralph Uckerby had held.

Unknown	Hugh (son of Ralph Uckerby), probably a tenant, gives the abbey 4 oxgangs (60 acres) of land in Ingram once held by Gilbert Hansard.	
1224	Thomas Uckerby, probably a tenant, grants ½ carucate of land in Ingram to the abbot of Rievaulx.	
1264-1267	Second Barons War	
1267	Gundreda (wife of Robert de Teasdale), heir of Thomas, quitclaims (conveys) the ½ carucate in favour of the abbey.

1534	The abbot grants a lease for 47 years to Christopher Bowes, yeoman.	
1543	Richard Vincent receives a grant from the Crown of Ingram. Richard obtains a licence to alienate (convey) Ingram to Christopher Bowes.	
1568	Christopher dies leaving a son and heir Marmaduke.	Edward VI 1547-53 Mary I 1553-58 Elizabeth I 1558-1603
1585	Marmaduke is hanged for concealing Roman Catholic priests, one of which he employed as schoolmaster for his children. He leaves half Ingram to his sons Robert and Thomas and half to his brother John.	
1607	Robert and Thomas sell their half of Ingram to Edward Raper.	James I 1603-25
1620	Edward dies leaving a son and heir George.

1624	John dies leaving a son and heir also John. George dies leaving his sisters as heirs, Julia (wife of William Todd) and Elizabeth. These are the last records of the two halves of Ingram.
