Before 1284	Sir Roger Mowbray, Baron of Thirsk grants Woodhill to Adam de Picton. Woodhill is in the territory of Thirsk under Duvelund. It carries with it the rights of common of pasture (to graze on common land) in the park of Duvelund. Adam also has rent and the reversion (estate after death) of 5 oxgangs (100 acres) of land held by Tezanta de Bail for life.		Edward I 1272-1307
1319	Adam dies leaving a sister and heir Itonia, who is aged 60 and more. Woodhill includes 5 bovates (100acres) of land, 4 ½ acres meadow and 55 acres of waste (land not used for farming). The lordship owes the Crown 1/10 knight's fee of service.		Edward II 1307-27 Edward III 1327-77

# Lordship of Woodhill

Date	History of Lordship	Monarchs
1327	Idonia alienates (conveys) Woodhill to John (son of Peter de Kilvington).	
1354	John sub-eneffs Woodhill to his son William and thus retains an overlordship. William has to obtain a pardon for the acquisition as he does not obtain a licence. William sells it to Peter Tempest who pays the fine for the previous conveyance.	
Unknown	Peter makes a settlement (a chain of ownership after death) of Woodhill on John (son of Sir Richard Tempest).	
1367	John Kilvington dies leaving the overlordship to his son John.	Richard II 1377-1399
1387	Peter dies but instead of Woodhill passing to John it is taken into King Richard's hands as Peter has no heirs.	
Unknown	King Richard grants Woodhill to William de Kilvington, a yeoman to the King's larder and probably a kinsman of the previous owner.	
1390	John dies leaving the overlordship to his son Thomas.	
Unknown	William conveys Woodhill to John de Ivelyth (clerk to King Richard).	
1396	King Richard makes a fresh grant of Woodhill to John de Ivelyth, confirming the previous conveyance.	Henry IV 1399-1413 Henry V 1413-22 Henry VI 1422-61 1470-71
Unknown	Woodhill returns to crown ownership.	
1429	Thomas makes a settlement of the overlordship on himself and his wife Margaret and their issue (children).	
1455-1487	<b>War of the Roses</b>	
1458	Margaret dies and the overlordship passes to her son Kilvington.	
1467	The overlordship passes to Elizabeth Talbot. Nothing further is heard of the overlordship.	Edward IV 1461-70 1471-83
1469	King Edward grants Woodhill to Henry Lokwode, yeoman of the King's chamber. Nothing further is heard of the lordship of Woodhill.
