1284	William Hoppeshort is holding Hoppeshortland, but he now provides a different service to King Edward. He is tasked with keeping 6 damsels (whores) for the King at the King's cost. This is called "pimp-tenure".	Edward I 1272-1307
Before 1303	The service is changed to the duty of carrying the King's horn when he hunts in the Hundred of Lambourn.	Edward II 1307-27
Unknown	William dies leaving a son and heir John.	
1307	John dies leaving a sister and heir Alice.	
Before 1309	Alice grants Hoppeshortland to William de Wanting and his son William. William grants Hoppeshortland to Richard de Pevensey and his wife Ela.	Edward III 1327-77
Unknown	Richard dies leaving Hoppeshortland with Ela. She grants it to the younger William and his wife Alice.	
1349	John de Wanting dies holding Hoppeshortland leaving a widow Joan and son William.	
1359	William comes of age and inherits Hoppeshortland.	
1360	William dies leaving a sister and heir Joan. Joan is an "idiot" and her custody is granted to John de Estbury.	
1365	John claims Joan has recovered and receives a grant of 3 messuages (farms), 3 virgates (90 acres) and 26 shillings 8 pennies of rent. He also leases 4 messuages and 4 virgates from Joan (widow of John de Wanting).	
1367	Joan de la Grave grants John a share in the manor of Hoppeshortland which had belonged to her mother Anastasia.	
1369	Joan de Wanting (the idiot) makes a further grant to John. He also acquires the remaining share of Hoppeshortland from John atte Mulle and William Dawe and their wives Joan and Agnes (sisters and heirs of John de Gomeledon).	
1374	John dies and the whole of the holding in Hoppeshortland is listed among his lands. The grants made by Joan de Wanting are disallowed due to her lunacy. His son and heir is another John.

1392	Joan de Wanting dies leaving her cousins Joan and Agnes. They are also heirs to Thomas de Winterbourn with another cousin Roger atte Green.	Richard II 1377-1399
1393	Roger grants 2 virgates (60 acres) in Eastbury to John de Estbury.	
1396	Thomas Goion and his wife Agnes (daughter of Thomas de Winterbourn) release Hoppeshortland manor to John.	
1406	John dies leaving Hoppeshortland to his sister Edith's grandson Ralph Arches.	Henry IV 1399-1413
1408	Ralph conveys Hoppeshortland to William Hankeford and others.	
1423	William dies leaving a grandson and heir Richard who settles Hoppeshortland on himself and his wife Anne.	Henry V 1413-22 Henry VI 1422-61 1470-71
Unknown	Richard grants Hoppeshortland to the co-feoffees (charitable trustees) of his grandfather William in return for a release of a claim on Eastbury Manor.

1534	The Act of Supremacy – Church of England	Henry VIII 1509-47 Edward VI 1547-53
